Gallery Page Submission Guidelines

Headshot Guidelines:

- Color Photograph.
- Taken as close to December 1988 as possible.
- No sunglasses.
- Prefer focus on head and shoulders; avoid extreme closeup of face.
- If wider shot, must be high-enough resolution to allow cropping to head and shoulders.
- Prefer photo of the person alone.
- If photo includes other people, they must be spaced apart, so the victim can be individually cropped; avoid photos with people very close together, arms around shoulders, etc.
- Features a closeup of the person's face, or is high-enough resolution to be cropped to the person's face.
- Resolution: Min. 400px wide, prefer 800px wide (when cropped to head and shoulders).
- Format: Digital photo in .jpg, .png, .tiff or .heic file format.


